Happy-go-lucky Director: Mike Leigh 2008 (118')



Poppy is a young woman in the prime of her life. In fact, she loves just about everything in her life; her family, her friends, her job. She has an optimism and an enthusiasm that affect all whoever comes into contact with her, even if they don't share this particular life view. In Happy-Go-Lucky Mike Leigh directs what must be his most positive film and which has at its core his most life-affirming character, Poppy, played to critical acclaim by Sally Hawkins. If the heroine of the piece is happy-go-lucky then this is not true of all those around her, especially those who have been dealt a difficult hand by life.

To be bothered: To have an interest in or care about something

Some parents just can 't be bothered.

Bear with me: Hear me out; listen to what I must say

To tell sb off/give sb a telling-off: Tell sb you are angry with them

because of something they have done What? He gave you a telling-off?

Uptight: Not calm or relaxed; easily annoyed or irritated

He's a little bit uptight.

Handy: Useful or easy to use

To dilly-dally: A colloquial expression meaning to hesitate or not act



Don't dilly-dally!

A nutter: An informal word for mad or insane

He sounds like a nutter.

I didn't bargain for that: I didn't expect that

Mate: Friend

I'm your mate, aren 't I?

To be down in the dumps: To be sad or slightly depressed about something

A bit down in the dumps, is he?

Search me: If you say this in response to a question it means that you have

no idea what the answer is

What was that all about? Search me!

To give somebody the creeps: To give sb a feeling of fear or horror

It gives me the creeps, to be honest.

To be out of order: To behave in an unacceptable way

You 're out of order, Scott!
