Yes, there is. No, there isn't.</i> <i>Where is the cinema? It's near the library.</i></p>	<p>- Use of <i>a / an</i> before jobs</p> <p>- Present simple with auxiliary <i>do</i> (interrogative form with all persons)</p> <p>- Present simple with auxiliary <i>do</i> (affirmative and negative form with all persons)</p> <p>- Preposition (time): <i>at</i></p> <p>- Frequency adverbs: <i>always, sometimes, never</i></p> <p>- Prepositions (place): <i>between, in front of, opposite</i></p> <p>- Use of possessive <i>'s</i> for shops</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Jobs: <i>doctor, nurse, teacher, secretary, clerk, hairdresser, mechanic, police officer, housewife, actor / actress, factory worker, engineer, fireman, waiter / waitress, vet(erinary), footballer, farmer</i></li> <li>• Verbs of action: <i>work, teach, drive, cook, help, repair, clean</i></li> <li>• Places in a town and public buildings: <i>street, post office, bank, cinema, park, café, hotel, library, station, hospital, museum, stadium, church, restaurant, fire station, police station, parking area</i></li> <li>• Signposts in town: <i>bus stop, traffic lights</i></li> <li>• Shops: <i>toy shop, music shop, sports shop, supermarket, shopping centre, department store, dairy, stationer's, chemist's, greengrocer's, baker's, butcher's</i></li> </ul>

Because...</i></p>	<p>- Imperative: direct form - <i>Do's and Don'ts</i></p> <p>- Modal verb <i>can</i> for requests (interrogative form)</p> <p>- Countable and uncountable nouns - Indefinite quantity: <i>some</i></p> <p>- Question word: <i>How much...?</i> - Irregular plural: <i>penny / pence</i></p> <p>- Question word: <i>Why...?</i> - Conjunction: <i>because</i></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Words for directions: <i>right, left, straight on, cross, turn</i></li> <li>• Food <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Countable nouns: <i>apple, orange, sweet, biscuit</i></li> <li>- Uncountable nouns: <i>sugar, flour, salt</i></li> </ul> </li> <li>• Numbers: <i>a hundred, a thousand</i></li> <li>• Money: <i>euro, pound, penny (pl. pence)</i></li> <li>• Landscapes: <i>sea, seaside, mountains, hills, lake, desert</i></li> <li>• Continents: <i>Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, North America, South America</i></li> </ul>
