Becoming pregnant as a teenager in Ireland in 1952, Philomena Lee was sent to a convent for "fallen women". When her son was just a toddler he was taken from her and given up for adoption. Searching in vain for her lost child, Philomena meets Martin, a journalist, who joins her in the search for the son she lost 50 years earlier.

To trace somebody: To find someone who was lost.

To baffle someone: To cause someone to be completely unable to

Slàinte: A Gaelic word meaning "health" and used as a drinking toast; used like "cheers".

To foot the bill: To pay for everything *My editor's agreed to foot the bill.*

To be as dull as ditchwater: To be very boring.

He's as dull as ditchwater.

A firm handshake: A strong handshake.

He had a firm handshake.

The highest bidder: The person who offers the most money during a sale or auction.

A smart alec: Someone who tries to appear clever or answer questions in a clever way that annoys other people.

To come round: To change your opinion of something or change your mind, often influenced by another person's opinion.

I'm sure he'll come round.

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
